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HOW THE PATHWAYS PROCESS WORKS

During the first three years at Hamstead Hall Academy all students follow the same wide range of courses. In Years 10 & 11 subjects are studied in far greater detail and therefore, there would simply not be enough time to take all the courses available. Consequently, your child will have to make some important choices guided by us.

All students will, for over half their timetable, follow compulsory subjects. These include: **Mathematics, English, Science, Physical Education, Personal Social and Health Education (PSHE) and a course in Religious Education and Citizenship.**

Each student, under guidance, will also be given the opportunity to follow an **Individual Learning Pathway**. The chosen pathway will involve a range of subjects giving the students a broader learning experience and ultimately greater individual success at the end of Key Stage 4.

Open Pathway

All students in Year 9 have been receiving Information, Advice and Guidance to support them to make their choices for Key Stage 4 and have been encouraged to discuss their preferences with their parents / carers.

Resource Base Pathway

Any student who is currently studying in resource base lessons will follow a bespoke pathway which is personalised to individual learning needs. Within the option blocks, resource base students will study subjects and qualifications bespoke to their needs. Our Head of Resource Base and SENCO will provide further advice and guidance on a one-to-one basis.

HOW THE PATHWAYS PROCESS WORKS

English and Maths

Research has shown that students have greater opportunity for success in the workplace if they have good levels of literacy and numeracy. To that end, the government is keen for as many students as possible to reach a standard of a grade 4 or higher in English and Maths. Students who do not achieve a 4 or higher in English and Maths by the end of year 11 are required to continue to study these subjects beyond the age of 16. We fully endorse this as we recognise that literacy and numeracy are essential life skills and will help to improve attainment for the students in all subjects. To support this and to help the students achieve their best grades in English and Maths, the students will all have extra time allocated to English and Maths during years 10 and 11.

Additional Information

There will also be courses and opportunities beyond 3.15pm and parents / carers should be aware that there may be opportunities for your child to study additional subjects and revision sessions beyond the school day such as Panjabi.

All choices will involve consultation between you and your child. The booklet has been carefully produced so that it will answer any queries you may have about courses, choices and examinations.

A deliberate attempt has been made to make the booklet attractive and to be brief and concise in subject detail. During the process, all students will have had the opportunity to discuss their subject choices with form tutors and subject staff.

All students' preferences are subject to agreement with Mr Mortimer (CEO), Mrs Tranter (Headteacher), Mr Bonner (Assistant Headteacher), Mr Holder (Assistant Headteacher), Ms Lynch and Mr Care (Progress Leader and Pastoral Leader for Year 9), Year 9 Form Tutors and all subject staff.

Top Tips for Choosing your options

☒ 1. Understand the Core Requirements

- All students must take **English, Maths, and Science** (usually combined or triple).
- Schools often require a **humanities subject** (History or Geography) and sometimes a **language**.
- Check your school's specific rules—some have compulsory subjects beyond the national core.

☒ 2. Think About Future Pathways

- Consider what you might want to do after GCSEs:
 - **A-Levels:** Some subjects (e.g., Physics, Chemistry) require specific GCSEs.
 - **Vocational courses or apprenticeships:** Practical subjects may help.
- If unsure, keep options broad—avoid narrowing choices too early.

☒ 3. Balance Interests and Strengths

- Choose subjects you **enjoy** and are **good at**—you'll spend two years studying them.
- If you dislike a subject now, it's unlikely to become enjoyable later.

☒ 4. Research Subject Content

- Ask teachers what the course involves—GCSE content can differ from KS3.
- Look at assessment methods: **exam-heavy** vs. **coursework-based** subjects.

☒ 5. Consider Workload and Style

- Practical subjects (Art, Design & Technology) often require **extra time for projects**.
- Academic subjects may involve **more revision and writing**.

☒ 6. Avoid Peer Pressure

- Don't pick a subject just because friends are doing it.
- Your choices should reflect **your goals and interests**, not someone else's.

☒ 7. Ask for Advice

- Speak to:
 - **Teachers** (for strengths and suitability)
 - **Careers advisors** (for future pathways)
 - **Older students** (for real experiences)

☒ 8. Keep an Eye on Future Career Options

- Some of your choices at Key Stage 4 will help support your future career.

☒ 9. Think Long-Term Skills

- Subjects like Computing, Business, or a language can be useful for careers.
- Creative subjects (Art, Drama, Music) build transferable skills too.

☒ 10. Don't Panic

- GCSE choices matter, but they **don't lock you into one career forever**.
- Many pathways remain open even if you change your mind later.

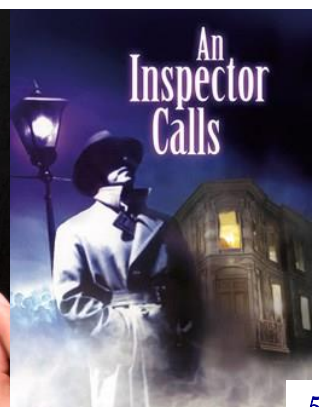
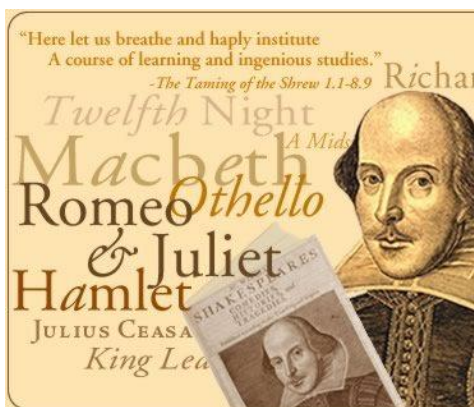

GCSE English is a compulsory subject in which different courses are available to students.

There are two GCSE courses available in English. Pupils will study both English Language and English Literature as separate courses (2 GCSEs). There is also a Step Up Silver and Gold qualification available. This provides pupils of different abilities with the opportunity to attain an English qualification.

- **GCSE English Language:**

GCSE Mathematics

Course Content

It is the aim of the Mathematics department that every student be given the opportunity to be assessed for positive achievement at every level of ability. To this end students will be assessed within a range of attainment so that they can show what they know, understand and can do.

Students will take the following course with Edexcel:

GCSE Edexcel Mathematics A - IMA1 (2-tier Linear GCSE)

GCSE specification IMA1 consists of three papers, one non-calculator and two calculator, all taken at the end of the course in year 11. Each paper will assess students' ability to recall, select and apply their knowledge of mathematics and to interpret, analyse and solve problems. There is no coursework.

The content of the GCSE Mathematics specifications has been grouped into the topic areas of Number, Algebra, Geometry, Measures, Statistics and Probability.

Statistics GCSE Year 10 - 11

Course Content

- Collection of data
- Processing and representing data
- Summarising data
- Scatter diagrams and correlation
- Time series
- Probability
- Index numbers
- Probability distributions

The assessment consists of two papers, each with a duration of 1 hour 30 minutes. The examination takes place in the Summer along with the other GCSE other. The exam is graded using the 9 - 1 grading system.

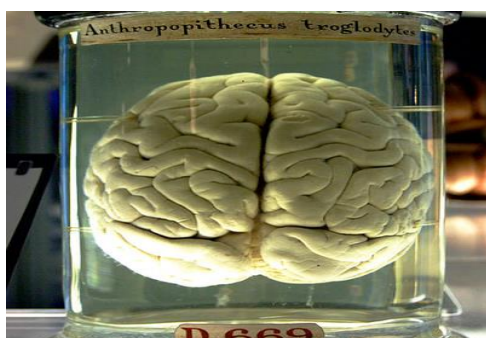
There is no coursework. Candidates are permitted to use a scientific and or graphical calculator (the latter is provided by the school) for both exam papers.

The course is designed to:

- Develop personal, learning and thinking skills.
- Develop an understanding of science based issues in the world.
- Develop skills in communication, mathematics and the use of technology in scientific contexts.
- Develop their ability to evaluate claims based on science through critical analysis of the method, evidence and conclusions

Future Pathways/Careers

Science opens up many opportunities including:

Clinical psychologist, sports scientist, engineer, forensic scientist, medicine, dentistry, music technology, animal healthcare, finance, photography, art restoration to name but a few!

The Courses

- In Year 9 you will have covered some “Core Science” knowledge that will support you in your GCSEs including disciplinary knowledge (Science skills).
- So now you are ready to make one of two choices, Combined Science which gives two GCSE grades or Separate Science which gives three GCSE grades.
- All students must do at least the Combined Science and the higher achievers (sets 1 & 2) will be invited by their Science teachers to choose the 3rd Science in the option block.
- There is no coursework!
- There are 8 practical activities for each GCSE grade gained. So Trilogy Combined Science requires 16 practical activities to be completed and Separate Science requires 24.
- You will be assessed by internal exams each term to monitor your progress.
- The external exams which give your final grades are at the end of year 11 only.
- There are 6 exams (2 per subject) for the Combined Science each lasting 1hr 15 minutes.
- There are 6 exams (2 per subject) for the Triple Science each lasting 1hr 45 minutes.

WE ARE LOOKING FOR:

- Enthusiastic and dedicated pupils who strive to achieve excellence in everything they do.
- Pupils should have a strong interest in this subject and be prepared to produce in depth research, experiment with materials and techniques, develop their practical skills and present their ideas in a creative manner.

THE COURSE:

- Pupils produce coursework (a portfolio) throughout Years 10 and 11, which contributes 60% of their overall grade. There is also a final examination in Year 11, which makes up the other 40% of marks.
- The portfolio of work must demonstrate their ability to respond to a stimulus, develop ideas and experiment with a broad range of processes, techniques and materials.
- Throughout the course, pupils will be given the opportunity to work in a wide variety of art media including paint, print, textiles and clay. Photography and drawing are also essential skills that pupils will develop over the duration of the course.

THE ART DEPARTMENT:

We are a very popular choice at GCSE as the course enables pupils to develop their individual aptitudes and interests, which encourages confidence and fosters a sense of achievement. Our teaching rooms have recently been refurbished and we offer extra-curricular sessions to all of our pupils in order for them to complete work or further develop their skills.

GCSE Computer Science is engaging and practical, encouraging creativity and problem solving. It encourages students to develop their understanding and application of the core concepts in computer science

Brief Content Description / Summary:

COMPONENT 1 - COMPUTER SYSTEMS

- Study how processors work.
- Investigate computer memory and storage.
- Explore modern network layouts and how they function.
- Build skills in the ever important realm of cyber security.
- Investigate how types of software are used within computer systems.
- Stretch wider comprehension of how computers and computing affect ethical, legal, cultural and environmental issues.

COMPONENT 2 - COMPUTATIONAL THINKING, ALGORITHMS AND PROGRAMMING

- Study fundamental algorithms in computer science.

Brief Content Description / Summary:

Component 1: Exploring User Interface Design Principles and Project Planning Techniques-

Learners will develop their understanding of what makes an effective user interface and how to effectively manage a project. They will use this understanding to plan, design and create a user interface based on a scenario given by the exam board.

Component 2: Collecting, Presenting and Interpreting Data

Learners will understand the characteristics of data and information and how they help organisations in decision making. They will use data manipulation methods to create a dashboard to present and draw conclusions from information

Component 3: Effective Digital Working Practices

Learners will explore how organisations use digital systems and the wider implications associated with their use.

The subject content for Drama is divided into three components.

Learners participate in the creation, development and performance of a piece of devised theatre using either the techniques of an influential theatre practitioner or a genre, in response to a set stimulus set.

Component 2: Performing from a text

- Learners will study and perform extracts from a published play.

Component 3: Interpreting Theatre

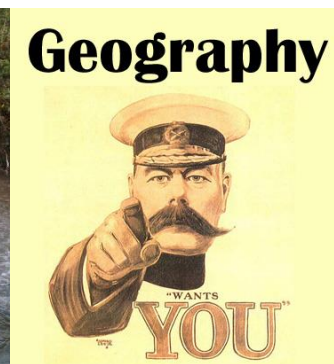
- Learners will study a set text practically and prepare to answer questions on this during a written exam in the summer.
- Students will watch a piece of live theatre and answer a question on this during their written exam.

Eduqas GCSE in Drama offers a broad and coherent course of study which enables learners to:

 - explore performance texts, understanding their social, cultural and historical context including the theatrical conventions of the period in which they were created
 - develop a range of theatrical skills and apply them to create performances
 - work collaboratively to generate, develop and communicate ideas
 - develop as creative, effective, independent and reflective learners able to make informed choices in process and performance
 - contribute as an individual to a theatrical performance
 - reflect on and evaluate their own work and that of others

2. Challenges in the Human Environment

A study of the new and updated Geography key themes including Urban issues and Challenges,

The Changing Economic World and The Challenge of Resource Management. 1 ½ hr examination at the end of year 11 35%.

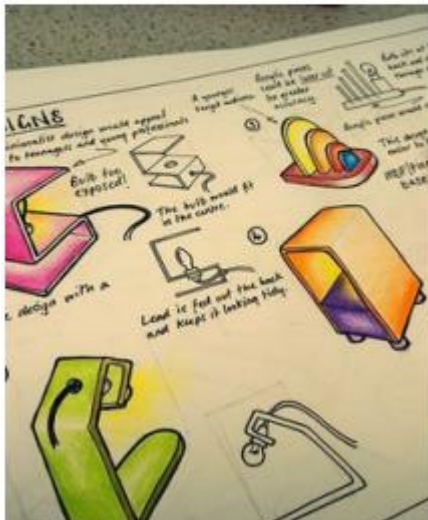
3. Geographical Application

This section requires pupils to undertake two contrasting fieldwork trips. It also requires students to use their learning from the themes studied to analyse a geographical issue, to consider solutions and justify their choices using pre-released materials. 1hr 15 minutes examination 30%.

ABOUT THE COURSE:

In 3D Design, you can work with a variety of materials such as textiles, wood, metal, and plastics, as well as digital tools for computer-aided design (CAD) and Computer-aided manufacturing (CAM). These materials allow you to prototype, model, and create functional and aesthetic products, giving you the flexibility to bring your creative visions to life.

The course is made up of two components: a Portfolio (60%) which is done throughout year 10/year 11, and an Externally set task (40%), which is 10 hours long with weeks preparation time beforehand.

A 3D Design GCSE can open doors to a wide range of creative careers, such as product design, architecture, or game design. Edexcel BTEC Tech Award Level 1 & 2 in Health and Social Care

Course Content

The course breakdown is as follows;

Component 1 - Human Lifespan Development (PSA - 30%)

Component 2 - Health and Social Care Services and Values (PSA - 30%)

Component 3 - Health and Wellbeing (External assessment - 40%)

In order for student's to fulfill the criteria of the course they must achieve 120 Guided Learning Hours (GLH). This will be achieved through completing two Pearson Set Assignments (PSA's) throughout the course and one external exam at the end of year 11.

The BTEC course provides a solid foundation for progression to health and social care related courses, BTEC Level 3 in Health and Social Care and a career in health care professionals.

The course is aimed at pupils who want to follow a career within health and social care and to develop their practical skills. The course also enables pupils to gain understanding of how the health industry works and how careers can be developed within the health industry.

Students will work with local schools' to develop skills in communication and gaining insight into the whole person and all their needs and rights as an individual.

Pupils will have the opportunity to visit primary schools and Special Educational primary and secondary schools.

GCSE HISTORY (EDEXCEL)

What is in the course?

Edexcel History covers 4 topics, covering a period study, a thematic study, a wider world depth study and a British depth study.

Paper 1: Medicine Through Time

You will be assessed in all 4 skills and each skill carries the same weight (25% each).

The new GCSE will rely on a list of words for you to learn and understand in a variety of topics. You will also need to show you can use French grammar well.

The Listening, Reading and Writing exams will be external exams, with a date imposed by the exam board, whereas the speaking test will take place a bit before and will be conducted on a date chosen by the school.

The exams are tiered. If you do Foundation, you will have access to grades 1-5 and if you do Higher, you will have access to grades 4-9.

This course is aimed at pupils who have demonstrated a good understanding of French during Key Stage 3. We will build on what you have already learnt and extend it so you can understand and communicate in French more effectively.

WHY STUDY LANGUAGES?

This is an excerpt from 'The Guardian' newspaper (April 2015)

Britain's economy is being seriously harmed because of a shortage of foreign language skills. In fact, according to the government's own statistics, it costs the country 3.5% of GDP every year - that's £48bn. James Foreman-Peck, professor of economics at Cardiff Business School described this as a "tax on growth", which sees the potential of small to medium-size exporters being hampered. This happens not just because they don't have the cash to employ lots of linguists like global companies do, but also because - without language skills - they are deterred from trading internationally.

One business leader, Nick Brown, explained: **"English is fine if you want to buy things, but it's not the right language to use for people who want to sell things."**

You will get priority place to take part to the trip to Paris.



GCSE LATIN (Eduqas)

What Latin can offer you:

- An understanding of the ancient world.
- Reading some of the world's most famous authors
- Enrich your English vocabulary
- Knowledge of a language, which is the foundation of most European languages, including English, thus helping you improve in these areas.
- Improvement in critical and analytical skills and intellectual flexibility, which will be useful in a wide range of jobs later or at university.



Latin remains a highly respected subject and the presence of Latin within the GCSE portfolio frequently confirms to university admissions tutors the candidate's high level of intellectual ability whatever degree course they wish to study. Although not compulsory, Latin is highly desirable for those interested in studying Law and Medicine.

Course contents:

The GCSE in Latin is made up of three components.

Component 1: Language

This represents 50% of the total GCSE mark.

We build on what we have already learnt in Years 7, 8 and 9. The passages increase in length and challenge, but the stories get more exciting! There is a defined list of vocabulary to learn and you will soon realise that you already know a lot of the words!

Component 2: Latin Literature and Sources

This represents 30% of the total GCSE mark.

This is what we have been working towards! We can finally tackle real Roman authors. This can appear daunting at first but do not worry! You will be guided throughout the study. This is an open book assessment, which means you get a clean copy of the resource booklet with a vocabulary list for the examination.

Component 3: Roman Civilisation

This represents 20% of the total GCSE mark. The other really exciting part of the GCSE: learning how the Romans lived! Through the study of sources and texts in English, we find out about a particular theme: in 2021, you will be assessed on your knowledge of Roman daily life. A lot of it we have already seen: Roman houses, the forum, slavery etc.

"It's usually private schools who have the opportunity to learn Latin. I feel very fortunate to be able to do so. We learn not just about the language but about civilisation too. I won't have the same opportunity to learn Latin in the future." – a Y10 student at HHA
